

THE 1982 CATALOGUE - A REPORT

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The report that follows is an explanation of the method of cataloguing the material excavated at Pizzica Pantanello in the summer of 1982. It also applies, to a smaller extent, to the 1981 cataloguing of the Pizzica excavation, the latter part of it being catalogued in 1982. The pottery lot numbers concerned in this respect are: PZ-81-526 PL to PZ-81-1022. As the author of both the catalogues concerned as well as this report, I hope that this will assist in finding and understanding the material dealt with.

I. THE GENERAL CATALOGUE

1) The first column is almost self-explanatory. It contains the provenance in which the sherds were found; the date they were found; four categories of RIMS~~X~~, BASES, HANDLES, and BODYSHERDS. Since the general catalogue is used only to record potsherds of ceramic vessels, these four categories seemed to be the most sensible. Anything that was found with the potsherds in a particular pottery lot that was not a ceramic vessel was placed elsewhere, after being noted in the OTHER column. A bodysherd is anything that is not obviously one of the other ~~the~~ three items mentioned. The last item in the first column is the pottery lot number.

The numbering system for the whole catalogue has been carried on in the same manner as other years; the numbers start at 1, and every pottery lot or other item(see OTHER and SPECIAL FINDS and TILE CATALOGUE) carries on the numbers from there in sequential order. I attempted to number everything in the order in which it was found, but this was not always possible.

The horizontal categories across the page were as follows: Under a general category of Fine Ware there are three sub-categories of GREY WARE~~X~~, BLACK GLAZE and PAINTED WARE/ Under a general category of Coarse Ware, there are six sub-categories of SEMI-FINE SOFT, SEMI-FINE GRAINY, SEMI-FINE HARD, BURNED (COOK) AMPHORAE, and HUGE and THICK. The final category was OTHER.

In cataloguing the sherds, the main objective was to try and pick out the most prominent characteristic of the piece, and place it in the appropriate category. In this respect, a sherd that was Grey Ware, black glaze or painted ware was always placed in that category, even if the sherd had another prominent characteristic. In the case of amphora sherds, whether they were made of soft, hard, grainy or any other fabric, they were always placed in the AMPHORAE column. In the case of sherds which were decorated, moulded, or unusual pieces, it was assumed that this was the most prominent characteristic of the sherd, and were either separated out and mentioned in the 'other' column, or, more usually, they were made into a special find (see OTHER and SPECIAL FINDS). It should be generally assumed, therefore, that items with the above characteristics were always placed in the columns mentioned, taking precedence over any other prominent characteristic that they may have had.

A) FINE WARE

Fine ware was interpreted to mean that the fabric of the pot sherd is made of a fine clay, with no (or very few) grainy inclusions; the sherd is not usually misfired, and has been made with some care. The feel of the sherd is smooth to the touch, though it can be of a soft or hard fabric (see SEMI-FINE SOFT and SEMI-FINE HARD). The most important characteristic of the sherd, however, was that it should comply with one of the three sub-categories :

1) GRAY WARE

This was a somewhat difficult category, as I am not terribly familiar with grey ware fabric. Consequently, only the most obvious grey-ware sherds made it to this column. A grey ware pot sherd was judged by a mixture of the form of the vessel, the feel of the vessel, and the colour. I am aware that misfired grey ware is often not grey, and these sherds probably will be found in the SEMI-FINE SOFT category.

A grey ware sherd is most often a thin vessel, and can be black glazed. There are no grainy inclusions, and the shape usually has a shallow curve. The most tell-tale sign that the sherd was grey ware is the pale or dark grey colour of the sherd, which continues throughout the core.

Since grey ware vessels have been dated to after the Roman colonisation of the Metaponto area, any sherds that have been catalogued as grey ware from archaic levels of the exca-

tion should be considered with deep suspicion. Thankfully, this occurred rarely, and mostly from pottery lots which had been gathered while cleaning the site.

2) BLACK GLAZE

Black glaze was interpreted to mean any sherd which had black glaze on any part of it. This does not include red-figure ware, which is always a special find. On occasion, sherds with no black glaze were placed in this category because the fabric of the sherd so resembled that used for black glaze vessels that it was assumed either: that the sherd had been black glaze, but had lost it along the way to the catalogue, through time or over-zealous washing; or that it was part of a black glaze vessel that had no black glaze on that particular area. The reason why I included these pieces in the black glaze category was for the sake of accuracy, and to assist those trying to reconstruct a black glaze vessel. Such an unglazed 'black glaze' sherd is usually of a fine (ie. no inclusions or unsightly lumps) fabric that has a distinctive salmon-pink colour. It is also soft in texture. Black glaze rims, handles and bases are also often distinctive; bases tend to be almost a separate part of the vessel, attached after the body was made. Very often these types of base look almost like a rim when upside-down, having a wide, flat lip which attaches to the rest of the base almost like a neck going inwards towards the bottom of the vessel:



Of course there are many different types of black glaze base, but if this one appeared in a pottery lot, and was of the right fabric and colour, it was generally placed in the black glaze category. Because of the great variety of black glaze rims and handles, I tended to rely on the fabric more than the shape if it was unglazed. Though I tried to place these in the correct category as often as possible, it is inevitable that many such sherds will have found their way to the semi-fine soft category, that being, in my opinion, their most salient alternative characteristic. (see also PAINTED WARE, below, for other notes).

3) PAINTED WARE

This category was interpreted to mean any sherd that was painted. For this reason, the definition of the general category of fine ware was stretched a little. In the archaic levels, painted sherds were often made of a coarseware fabric, but they were nevertheless placed under the painted ware category because I felt that was their most prominent characteristic.

This category also contains what I now realise to be a certain amount of black glaze ware, also from the archaic levels. There are two reason for this: i) the sherd may have been badly fired, so that the glaze had a matt texture, and not a sheen as black glaze usually does. This effect is also produced when a sherd has been in soaked ground for a long time. ii) the glaze had been applied in distinct lines on the body of the vessel, not solidly covering it as is normally the case. At the time, I felt it was necessary to distinguish the use of black glaze in this fashion from the other black glaze sherds. Though the material used for painting the lines onto the sherd was black glaze, in my opinion, the vessel was nevertheless painted, not glazed, or at least more so than a normal black glaze vessel. Some time after I had been cataloguing in this fashion, it was pointed out to me that these sherds should be placed in the black glaze category. There has been no time to alter this confusion, and so I advise those who wish to find black glaze from the archaic levels to search both in the painted ware category and the black glaze category, particularly if a vessel ~~with~~ of a semi-fine soft, purplish coloured fabric is being searched for.

As may have been gathered by the description above, painted ware was distinguished from other sherds both by the matt texture of the paint, as opposed to the sheen of the glaze, and the fact that lines of some sort may have been applied. The fabric is less important in this category than the fact that the sherd was painted. Occasionally, red glaze (not Arretine or African Red Slip) sherds found their way to the painted ware category. This was due to ignorance and the lack of a red glaze category.

III. COARSE WARE

Coarse ware sherds were the majority of sherds recorded in the 1982 catalogue. These were the vessels of everyday use, made for practical purposes such as transporting and storing wine and oil (amphorae), or cooking. For this reason, coarse ware vessels were made to carry out a function and not to be decorative or showy. Therefore, the fabrics used to make coarseware vessels were not fine, smooth clays as in with fineware fabrics. They often contain inclusions of grit or ground pot sherds. The shapes of coarseware pots are mostly simple, with no superfluous appendages. The vessels are mostly thicker than fineware vessels, because they need to be more durable, and so through more of a battering than fine ware. A base such as the one described in BLACK GLAZE would be impractical, as it would snap off very easily. These were not expensive or carefully cared-for pots. It is interesting to note in this respect that the shapes and types of coarseware pots tend to change less markedly over time than the fine ware vessels.

1) SEMI-FINE SOFT

This category has been stretched a little in terms of the word 'semi-fine'. If the most marked property of the sherd was soft, then it was placed in this category, providing, of course, it was not an amphora sherd, black glaze, painted ware, decorated, moulded, engraved or terracotta, etc. The stretching of the ~~definiti~~ definition occurred when:

- a sherd was unglazed fineware
- a sherd was small fragments of votive vase, but were not recognised as such at the time.
- were coarse, not semi-fine, much whose major property was soft - i.e., no grainy inclusions, feeling soft to the touch, and has a 'powdery' appearance, in that the softness of the fabric means that it tends to powder a little on the surface, leaving marks of ceramic powder on the fingers.

* A very large number of sherds have been placed in this category, and so it is difficult to define what types of vessels were made of this fabric, without writing more than I have time to at the moment.

2) SEMI-FINE GRAINY

This category was interpreted to mean coarseware sherds that contained grainy inclusions, whether as a result of the type of clay used (sand, grit, etc.) or the mixing of the clay with

crushed ceramic vessels, or both. The sherd feels grainy to the touch, and often grains fall away from the surface when handled. Most of these sherds are quite soft, though there are some quite hard sherds whose 'grainyness' in the fabric was obvious, and therefore they have been placed in this category. A sherd whose hardness superceded its graininess as a major characteristic was placed in the semi-fine hard category, and burned or cooked sherds that were also grainy were placed in the burned (cook) category. Mortarium sherds were distinctive by their unusually large grainy inclusions, as well as the thickness of the vessel, and were usually mentioned in other, rather than being placed in the semi-fine grainy category.

3) SEMI-FINE HARD

This category was interpreted to mean a sherd whose major characteristic was hard. The sherd feels hard to the touch, not 'powdery' as with semi-fine soft sherds, nor do grains fall off the surface as with many semi-fine grainy sherds. The ~~wires~~ broken edges of the sherd are sharp, even if there has not been a fresh break. If (accidentally, of course) dropped onto another sherd, a semi-fine hard sherd will sound almost metallic, making a 'clink', as opposed to the dull 'clunk' that a semi-fine soft sherd makes.

Semi-fine hard sherds may or may not contain inclusions, but their most noticeable feature must be hard in order to be placed in this category.

Many semi-fine hard sherds have been abused in some way to make them hard—over-firing, cooking, etc., can give a vessel very hard properties which were not originally intended.

Again, the word 'semi-fine' has been stretched to include quite coarse sherds, and also slightly finer than semi-fine.

4) BURNED (COOK)

This category is one of the more distinctive. A burned or cooked (meaning also cookware) sherd has several outstanding and unmistakeable characteristics:

- i) it is most often very grainy, and the fabric is a little soft as well, so the grains fall off when touched.
- ii) the core of the sherd is distinctive in that it appears to have thin flake-like or wafer-like layers—almost stratified. This is not like a normal, or even a misfired sherd, both of which have a fairly solid core.

iii) As a result of having been in a fire at some point, the surfaces of the sherd are often darkened or charred in patches, or throughout the entire sherd.

A sherd which did not have these common smoky inclusions was placed in this category as long as it had characteristics ii) and iii). A misfired sherd, which was burned in the kiln, rather than after its fabrication was placed in the category most appropriate to its major characteristics, or, more often, it was mentioned ~~as~~ in the 'other' column. The reason for this was in order to show that the area being excavated ~~as~~ probably produced pottery itself, there being no reason why one should transport misfired vessels elsewhere than the source of their sorry production.

5) AMPHORAE

If a sherd was part of an amphora, this fact took precedence over all other coarse ware categories. An amphora body-sherd has several distinctive characteristics:

i) Amphora sherds are quite a bit thicker than most other coarseware sherds (except pithos, and those in the HIGH and THICK categories). The reason is simple enough; amphorae are generally larger than other vessels.

ii) The inside of the vessel often has distinctive wheel ridges. They are often thick, so that the troughs between the ridges are as deep as the ridges are high, making them very prominent. Even when this is not the case, amphora wheel ridges are almost always prominent, and set further apart than in other vessels. Other vessels may have no ridges at all, or very much less prominent ones.

iii) The curvature of amphora bodies are often distinctive: first, they will tend to be less curved than other vessels, both because they are larger, and because amphorae tend to have less bulbous shapes than most other coarseware jars and jugs. Second, because many amphorae from this excavation go out from the neck, and then turn sharply inwards towards a slim base or foot. The point of this change in shape produces an angle in the vessel not present in other coarseware vessels. Furthermore, the conical shape that forms the rest of the pot below that point is fairly distinctive as well.

iv) There are many types of rim, neck, handle and base of amphorae, but these are all fairly distinctive to such vessels. To discuss them all in detail would require far more knowledge

than I have, so I will briefly mention some of the more obvious characteristics. a) In my experience, amphorae always have some sort of neck - which is sensible, as the vessel is used for carrying, storing and transporting liquids such as oil and wine, which need to be poured out and into; a neck would assist in both functions~~s~~ to prevent spillage. An amphora neck can be as thick or even thicker ~~thick~~ than the body thickness, and can be quite long - as much as a foot or more. Very often the neck joins the body almost at right angles; and is shaped like a thick tube. A body sherd that looked like this was catalogued as an amphora body sherd, unless:

a) the rim was also there, in which case it was catalogued as a rim, providing very little of the neck was in existence.

b) the neck was complete, or a large part of it was there, in which case it was mentioned in the 'other' column.

P.S. Handles may be attached to the neck: if so, the amount of neck and handle in existence decided how it was catalogued: if there was very little of the neck, but a good deal of handle, it was placed in the handle category; if there was very little of either, it was placed in the bodysherd category; if there was a lot of both, it was mentioned in 'other'.

b) Amphora rims are very varied, though a common one is ~~the~~ the type that seems to have been folded over onto the neck, ~~ext~~ rather like a rolled-up shirt sleeve, though with less folds. Another common ~~walk~~ rim is one that comes away from the neck almost at right angles. The rim may have a handle attached to it, in which case the sherd was mentioned in the 'other' column. (AMPH/ RIM W/HANDLE).

c) Amphora handles come in very diverse shapes and sizes, and can be attached to almost any part of the top half of the vessel. However, they are all thicker than most other coarseware handles. The shorter they are, the thicker they will be in order to support the weight of the vessel. There is little more that one can say about amphora handles in this context, due to their large variety.

d) Amphora bases are also distinctive, though once again there are a large variety of shapes. There are two basic ~~diff~~ types of base: the 'foot', and the base monop. The foot of an amphora is not a base at all, but a kind of knob, rounded or a sharp end to the bottom of the vessel. These types of bases have been placed in the ~~ext~~ 'other' column, as they are not truly

a base. The other type of base is such like many other coarseware vessels, except for the fact that they have the wheel ridges and unusual thickness mentioned before.

6) HUGE and THICK

Huge and thick is fairly completely descriptive of this category. There are just some ceramic vessels that were huge, thick, and frankly, ugly. These are huge chunks of vessels, even too large to be amphorae, and are most often pieces of sithos. The walls of these vessels can be several inches thick. If it was obvious to me that the object was part of a sithos, then I mentioned it in 'other'. **HUGE AND THICK SHERDS ALSO DO NOT HAVE WHEEL RIDGES, AS AMPHORAE DO.**

III OTHER

This column is probably the most important in the entire catalogue. I cannot stress strongly enough that this column should be read despite the fact that most of the information is squashed into a very small space and therefore a little hard on the eyes.

Uses for this column have already been mentioned throughout this report. The different uses for this column are as follows:

- 1) To record potsherds that do not fit into any of the other categories- e.g. a cooking pot lid.
- 2) To note the removal of any sherd from the pottery lot, either to another pottery lot, or to the SPECIAL FINDS catalogue. This was done because the sherd was special in some way- an unusual or important vessel (e.g. votive vase, unventarrium); a vessel that is almost complete in some way(es, a almost complete rim); a vessel that has moulding, engraving, decoration or red-figure on it; a sherd that is important for chronological studies (e.g. a distinctive amphora handle).
- 3) To note the removal of: terracotta fragments; tiles (see TILE CATALOGUE); stone; metal; wood; organic things; bone; soil samples; pollen samples, and to record the special find number they have been removed to.
- 4) To note any sherd that is of particular interest, though not special enough to make into a special find. This is very important. Though I may realize that some particular piece is of interest, I am not familiar enough with some of the material to know whether it should be a special find or notxx when the piece is not especially decorated, etc. Therefore, when I noticed something that caught my eye as unusual, I will have mentioned it in the 'other' column, if I felt there was no real

reason to make it into a special find. The objects in this category are fairly small in number, so I tended to act on the side of caution, making things into special finds even if I thought it was probably not worth it. However, on days when the pressure of work was particularly high, my judgement was a little biased, and unless I knew full well that an object ought to be a special find, I simply mentioned it in the ~~other~~ 'other' column. I stress again, therefore, that this column should be read.

This has had to be a brief description of the general catalogue, but I hope that it will help in interpreting the results of the 1982 dig, and make the reader aware of the possible areas of error due to my inexperience in cataloguing when I first started doing it this summer. There are a couple of points to add about the general catalogue before I go on to explain the tile catalogue and the special finds.

First, in some cases a pottery lot did not have the exact format described above. Instead of writing rims, bases, handles and bodysherds in the first column, and using the catalogue columns across the page as is usual, these were dispensed with, and the contents of the pottery lot ~~etc~~ was described across the page. This was done rarely, and the reason for it was that there was hardly anything at all in the pottery lot, and it seemed insensible to use up all the space for three or so uninspiring potsherds.

Second, the pressure of time meant that I simply could not reconstruct pots. The pottery lots contain, I am sure, a large number of complete vessels which are in fragments. I tried to make sure that these pieces were at least separated out into smaller bits ~~within~~ within the pottery lots so as to make reconstruction an easier task. On occasion, I mentioned in 'other' that a piece in one pottery lot probably was a part of several pieces in another pottery lot.

Thirdly, I don't think that I mentioned anywhere that loomweights were always removed from the pottery lot and made into a special find.

III.

TILE CATALOGUE

Since tiles can in no way be described as ceramic vessels, they had to be removed from the pottery lot in the general catalogue, and placed elsewhere. At first, tiles were made into special finds, but after a very short time, I decided that this was a despicable waste of time, as tiles are usually not terribly useful in archaeology unless they are whole (so as to discern the size of tiles), and except in the sense of their existence, indicating that some building existed where they were found. The reason for this is that tiles have not been very systematically studied in the past, probably because they are not the most inspiring objects to look at. There has been a small project this year at Pizzica to try and rectify this fact, started by Robert Folk (Luigi to all who know him here), the geologist, and carried on by Gene Storie (our resident lawyer) after ~~Luigi~~ Luigi left. However, there have been no concrete results as yet.

The solution to the problem of where to catalogue tiles was a simple one: I made a tile catalogue. All tiles that were found after 11 June 1982 are recorded in the tile catalogue, and all those before are recorded in special finds.

A tile is fairly easy to distinguish from other pot sherds: the most obvious sign is that tiles do not have wheel ridges, but straight lines, as if the clay had been smoothed with a pallet knife. No ceramic vessels have these lines. The other obvious sign is that a tile is very often flat, which vessels are not. Sometimes, a tile may have been mistaken for a huge and thick vessel, as the curves on these vessels are hard to discern when there is only a small piece to work from. There are also, of course, a large number of curved tiles, much like the roof tiles used today on southern Italian houses, though larger. These are distinguishable by their shape, which is non-pot-like, as anyone who has seen a modern ceramic roof tile will know. The fabrics are very large in number, and can resemble pot fabrics (coarseware, of course); it is easier to tell what fabric is unlikely to be tile- for example, the very grainy fabric that is used to make a mortarium. It is far easier to tell a tile not by its fabric, but by its shape and these characteristic lines that have already been mentioned. Knowing tile fabrics comes from dealing with them for a while, and is not something that I can really describe. Tiles are usually thicker than most vessels,

with the exception of some amphorae and oithoi. However, there are a large number of different thicknesses of tile, and so if one is trying to discern a tile by looking at the sherd's thickness, one can only really say that it must not be thinner than around 3/4 of an inch, and I'm sure that a tile will turn up sooner or later that will break even this rule.

The tile catalogue was set out as follows: in the first column, the provenance in which the tile was found was recorded, then the date, and then the catalogue number of the tile. Most often, this number is very close to the pottery lot number with which the tiles were found. In any case, the fact that tiles were removed, and the number they were removed to were mentioned in the 'other' column of the general catalogue.

Horizontally along the page there are two general catalogues of PANTILES and COVER TILES, both of which are split into four sub-categories of LONG EDGE ONLY, SHORT EDGE ONLY, CORNER, and NO EDGES. Finally, there is an 'other' column.

1) PANTILES

A pantile is always, in my experience, flat, with two lips along the long edges going at right angles to the flat body, and are rectangular in shape. They are usually thicker than cover tiles, and tend to be made of a different fabric, and therefore are a different colour. Where most cover tiles (unless misfired) are reddish-orange (of course there are many exceptions), pantiles tend to be a variety of pale colours, ranging from almost white, yellowish, cream, to grey. The short edges of pantiles are often unfinished, looking almost as if a large long slab of clay pantiles were sliced up to make smaller pantiles, leaving the cut edges as they were.

2) COVER TILES

A cover tile is most often curved, thinner than a pantile, though longer but less wide. Any lips that exist will be smaller and far less noticeable than pantile lips. Though a cover tile can be almost flat, there is usually at least the hint of a curve. The short edges are more finished than pantile short edges, though not much more. The long edges tend to be finished by a thickening of the tile all along the long edge, flattened along the edge, and rounded off to join the rest of the tile.

The four sub-categories mentioned above should be self-explanatory, except to say that when tile fragments were placed

categories, it did not mean that they had whole edges, but just a part. Often, tiles did not fit very well into these categories, which leads me to think that there must be a better system for cataloguing tiles. However, In the cases where the tile did not fit into the categories set out, (for instance, a tile can have a short edge and two long edges, or may be a kiln tile), it was mentioned in 'other'. If there were very few tiles in the tile lot, then the information was written across the page if those tiles did not fit well into the categories.

IV. SPECIAL FINDS

There were several reasons why items were made into special finds:

- 1) If they were not ceramic: wood, soil, pollen samples, bones, seeds, organic matter, metal, stone, etc.
- 2) If they were not ceramic vessels (except in the case of tiles): loomweights, terracotta fragments, kiln supports, statuettes, etc.
- 3) If the vessel was complete or almost complete, or if there was a wholerim or something important like that.
- 4) If the sherd was significant in some way for chronological studies. (e.g. an archaic cup rim, or an unusually shaped amphora handle)
- 5) Any sherd that was decorated, engraved, stamped, painted with a design, moulded or in any other way worked with particularly interesting designs or fabrics.
- 6) If the sherd was red-figure, part of a votive vase, unguuentarium, or any other very small fineware vessel.
- 7) If the sherd was interesting in any other way, either because I had never seen anything like it, or because it tickled my fancy.

The main point of special finds, which should have been gathered by now, is to separate out and pay special attention to anything that is out of the ordinary, and to give it a separate number so that it can be found more easily.

The special finds sheets on which the object was described are the same format in other years, and are self-explanatory in terms of the information given at the top of the page. In the case of wood and organic matter samples, this was the only part of the sheet that was filled out. The reason for this is that I know absolutely nothing about the study of wood or organic materials.

The main point of making them into special finds was to give them numbers, and to keep a record of where they came from.

In the case of bones, I usually sketched them, attempting to say what kind of bone it was, and perhaps make a guess at what animal it came from. In certain cases, however, the number of bones on one special find sheet were so large that I simply wrote down a list of what was there, and how many were there.

Bone special finds also include teeth and jaws found with the bones, and on a separate sheet with a separate number, shells found in the same area. On one occasion, this meant a tortoise shell, but in most others these were seashells and snail shells.

In the case of metals and stone, I usually sketched the object, gave its dimensions, and made some guess at what I thought it was.

In the case of all the ceramic and terracotta special finds, the information I gave depended very much on what, if anything, I knew about the object concerned. I always sketched the fragment, and gave its dimensions, or made a note that the drawing was approximately life size. I also gave the colour of the fragment by using the Munsell soil charts. In most cases, the only real description was the message written under 'OBJECT' on the special finds sheet. The reasons ~~this~~ for this are that:

- a) in most cases I felt that the sketch was enough of a definition of what the object was, needing little more to be said about it.
- b) I didn't know precisely what the object was, and did not have time to search for it in the reference books, so rather than mislead someone by making a wrong guess, I left it to the reader's imagination.

If I thought some object was of particular importance or interest, I generally marked the running list with a star next to the last column.

That is about all I can say of the work I did here in the summer of 1982. As has been noted several times throughout the report, I would have liked more time in order to do more, but time is something that people rarely have on excavations. All I can say is that I did what I could in the time that I had, and had a great time doing it, even if at times things got a little frantic in the pot shed. There will, I think, inevitably be things that I have forgotten to say, and I will apologise for that now. 
ADDENDA

In certain places in my report, I have mentioned information relating to the archaic levels of the excavation, without really saying where or what these levels were. There were several signs in a pottery lot which indicated to me that the sherds were archaic:

- 1) The presence of ionic cups; these cups are most often glazed or painted, and have distinctive rims and handles. The rim is off-set from the body of the vessel, and splayes outwards a little. The edge of the rim simply ends as it were, without any special moulded decoration, or special forming of the rim:



The handles are distinctive in that they are angled upwards, rather than horizontal or flat against the pot, and they have a distinctive shape, more 'triangular' than later handles:




The cup may be shallow or deep, and can be very large, (as much as about 25cm across the rim), but usually they are around 10cm in diameter at the rim. These cups have thin walls, and are made of a fine clay. One can distinguish a 6th century cup from a 7th century cup from the decoration on the rim: a 7th century cup will have horizontal stripes on the rim, whereas a 6th century cup will have an almost solid glaze.

- 2) There is far more painted ware in the archaic levels than in the more recent levels. On occasion, there is even a painted tile or two.
- 3) There is a definite absence of grey ware pottery.
- 4) There are fewer amphora sherds, though why this should be is not entirely clear to me.
- 5) The colours of the fabrics change somewhat: there are a larger number of creamy-coloured vessels, as well as darker reds and oranges.
- 6) Lekanis sherds appear more often in the archaic levels: that is, a large, usually semi-fine soft vessel, shaped like a deep bowl with a flat base, and distinctive rims and handles: The rim is usually at right angles to the body, and often is stratified in horizontal lines:



The handles are distinctive in that they are attached at both ends on to the surface of the rim:



- There is a handle on opposite sides of the rim, and they are almost always shaped in the manner sketched.
- 7) The archaic layers are, of course, at lower levels in the area excavated. So that, for example, in the N'-5, O'-5 Baulk, one can expect to find archaic sherds below Batt. 4., and this is born out by a noticeable change in the items catalogued in these levels, as compared to higher levels.
